## Formal Education

**Promoting access to quality education along with wholistic development opportunities through formal schooling of children from most disadvantaged families, difficult circumstances, below poverty line households, marginalized communities and slum settlements.**

Education is the key intervention for making a long-term difference in lives of children and one of the most important rights of every child. However various unfavourable circumstances deprive some children from receiving even basic level of education. The organization's educational support is particularly important for vulnerable children who come from disadvantaged settings by providing them access to quality education program and mainstreaming them in formal schooling. These children often face numerous obstacles in accessing quality education, including poverty, lack of resources, and social stigma. Through its shelter homes, the organization provides formal schooling to children who might not otherwise have access to education.

Formal schooling is essential for a child's development and future prospects. It provides children with the knowledge and skills they need to succeed in life, including basic literacy and numeracy skills, critical thinking, problem-solving, and social skills. Education also plays a crucial role in breaking the cycle of poverty, as it can provide children with the tools and knowledge, they need to secure better employment opportunities in the future.





**Enrolment Data & Gender split of School Projects (2024-25):**




**Caste wise Enrolment Data of School Projects (2024-25):**





**Academic Performance of Students enrolled with School Projects (2024-25):**





## TACKLING HOMELESSNESS

### ***Ensuring safe, healthy and nurturing environment to children in need of care and protection through residential care and long-term rehabilitation***

Child Care Institutions are one of the most important structures of the overall protection ecosystem of children in need of care and protection. I-India has been providing a secure living environment for the most vulnerable children through its two children homes, allowing them to experience a safe and nurturing childhood. The children are orphan, abandoned, surrendered, run-away, victims of violence, sexual abuse, neglect, beggars and belong to disadvantaged and difficult families. They are provided with care, nutrition, health care, education and vocational training for their long-term development and reintegration as able adults.

**SNEHAANCHAL** boys' shelter home at Jhag was founded in 2009.


**PREETI-PRABHA** is a home for orphaned girls. It was founded in 2011.

The shelter homes run by I-India provide a nurturing environment for children in need, with a dedicated team of full-time caregivers, wardens, cooks, teachers, hobby instructors, and a nurse collectively facilitating the provision of love, shelter, security, nutrition, and medical care. In addition to attending a formal school, the children also receive skills training through I-India's vocational center. They are educated on their legal and financial rights, social values, and receive emotional support through counselling. It's important to note that all of these homes operate under the provisions of the Juvenile Justice Act and are under the jurisdiction of the Child Welfare Committee of Jaipur, Rajasthan.

- Access to formal education, life skills building and vocational training
- Regular medical, nutritional and health care


## HEALTH CARE AND MEDICAL ASSISTANCE

**Promoting health and wellbeing by improving access to quality healthcare, medical assistance, specialized services by qualified health-care professionals to the ones deprived of basic healthcare and in urgent needs**


The provision of healthcare and medical assistance is of paramount importance, particularly for underprivileged children and communities. It not only addresses immediate health concerns but also focuses on preventive measures, which are vital for maintaining a healthy population. By offering a range of services, we aim to improve the overall quality of life, enhance productivity, and contribute to the long-term development of the communities we serve. Our organization is dedicated to delivering a wide range of healthcare services, including preventive, emergency, restorative, curative, and specialized treatments. Through our multifaceted health intervention programs at Jhag Children's Village, community health outreach initiatives, and health units at Shwetaark Centre DCM, thousands of children and families have access to essential medical check-ups and specialized care.

I-India's healthcare interventions are carried out by a dedicated and skilled team of doctors, medical assistants, and para-medics. They possess the necessary expertise and qualifications to provide comprehensive medical care to our beneficiaries. Furthermore, our multifaceted approach ensures that healthcare services are delivered through various channels. Jhag Children's Village serves as a primary hub for comprehensive medical care, catering to the specific needs of children and families. Our community health outreach programs extend our services beyond the village, reaching out to remote areas and marginalized communities, where access to healthcare is limited. Additionally, the health units at Shwetaark Centre DCM provide specialized care and support, addressing specific health challenges faced by our beneficiaries. The operational cost of the health program is supported by the Paromita-Sameer Mehta Family in Singapore, while the infrastructure has been generously provided by the Dev-Rashantha Devanesan Family, Singapore/Srilanka.


**Month wise health interventions conducted by medical team of I-India in rural areas (2024-25):**

**Classification of beneficiaries supported by health interventions (2024-25):**




## Pathological Lab at Jhag Children's Village

I-India's Health centre has a fully functional Path-lab at Jhag children's Village. The lab is equipped with modern diagnostic equipment and staffed by trained medical professionals who provide affordable and accessible healthcare services to disadvantaged children, village people and those who need it as there are no accessibility to such medical services in the area and surrounding.


The lab conducts various tests such as blood tests, urine tests, and other diagnostic tests that help in the early detection and prevention of diseases. They also offer health check-ups and counselling services to patients, which helps in educating them about various health issues and ways to prevent them.

**Mobile Health Camps:** Mobile Health camps for the rural population living around Jhag/surrounding villages and urban slums of Jaipur city is a key intervention of our Health Program. Through this program, health check-up, free medicines and treatment advice was given on-spot to marginalized population by the medical team along with general awareness on healthy living, personal hygiene, and sanitation. These camps also identify the demand and needs of specialized medical interventions in their communities and ultimately provides referral care.

**School Healthcare Camps:** Under these camps, interventions related to general health screening, nutrition, assessment of Height, Weight, BMI, deformities, and First Aid have been undertaken. For specialized Health Screening, which includes assessing Dental, Eye, Ear, Skin etc. related conditions has been facilitated with the support of doctor volunteers, government hospitals and other allied agencies.

**Camps on Menstrual Health and Hygiene:** Menstrual hygiene Management is fundamental to the dignity and wellbeing of girls. Menstrual hygiene education, availability of water and toilets, safe sanitation facilities with access to sanitary products, are important factors enabling girls to attend school and lead a healthy life, not interrupted by menstruation. Keeping this agenda on priority, our healthcare program has not only facilitated educational sessions on menstrual hygiene but also provided supplies such as: sanitary napkins and hygiene products to young girls of rural and urban areas.

**Camps for detecting & treating anaemia:** As a part of these camps, regular tracking of haemoglobin levels of young girls has been undertaken at school projects and community settings with the support of in-house pathological lab. Further, informative sessions on the signs, symptoms of anaemia and the need to receive medical help at the right time have been organized for different groups.



## VOCATIONAL TRAINING


**Working closely with public and private sector partners, I-India strives to create innovative, sustainable and equitable livelihoods through its diverse range of vocational trainings programmes for children in need of care and protection as well as adolescents and women from marginalized communities and urban poor settlements.**

I-India has been providing skills training in partnership with Ladli Crafts & Livelihoods through its vocational centers based at Jaipur & village Jhag, enabling adolescents (16+), youth and women groups in need to learn practical skills for their future careers. The programme is aimed at equipping them with the skills and knowledge necessary to secure employment, financial freedom and break the cycle of poverty.

Over the past year, we have continued to prioritize vocational training for adolescents/youth from disadvantaged backgrounds, with a particular focus on those who are out of school, dropouts, or at risk of dropping out. Our programs have included training in a range of areas, including tailoring, block printing, stitching, jewellery making, crafts, decors and State Certified computer skills courses (IT).

Our approach to vocational training has been holistic, with a focus on not just providing technical skills but also on developing soft skills such as self-confidence, communication, teamwork, and problem-solving. The vocational training environment is fun, safe and relaxed. Under the financial inclusion and legal awareness program, the participants regularly get orient to save their incentives into bank accounts, learn personal financial management and secure legal entitlements.

**No. of participants enrolled with vocational training during the year: (2024-25):**






## SAFE, VIBRANT AND HEALTHY CITIES FOR ADOLESCENTS

*Enabling creation of safe, vibrant and healthy adolescents' friendly public spaces through enhancing knowledge among key officials, stakeholders and systematic public space audit and tactical urbanism*

I-India started the 'Safe, Vibrant and Healthy cities for Adolescents' Project in Jaipur from November 2022 with support from world Resource Institute. The project is part of the Healthy Cities for Adolescents (HCA) Program which is a global initiative that aims to enhance the health and well-being of adolescents in secondary cities through multi-stakeholder, community-centre & led intervention. The aim of this project is to build knowledge and focus on awareness about the importance of Safe, Vibrant and Healthy Public Spaces for the overall well-being and development of adolescents specifically in the age group of 10-19 years. Through this project, the intent is to build a foundational system for furthering long-term actions for public spaces in these target cities. This project intends to open a discussion around adolescent friendly cities with focus on public spaces.


